# 2.0 DECLARATION OF PECUNIARY AND CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

Section 442 of the Local Government Act, 1993 states that a "pecuniary" interest is as follows:

- "(1) [Pecuniary interest] A Pecuniary interest is an interest that a person has in a matter because of a reasonable likelihood or expectation of appreciable financial gain or loss to the person or another person with whom the person is associated.
- (2) [Remoteness] A person does not have a pecuniary interest in a matter if the interest is so remote or insignificant that it could not reasonably be regarded as likely to influence any decision the person might make in relation to the matter."

Members should reference the Local Government Act, 1993 for detailed provisions relating to pecuniary interests.



# 1. Online Liquor Gets Audited Report

Action Item 4.4 of the June meeting regarding Online Supply of Alcohol – Research and Report:

That the Committee Chair formally write to Liquor and Gaming NSW, Minister responsible for Liquor Licensing and local State MPs to request that the report recommendations be implemented.

# 2. Nitrous Oxide Bulbs correspondence

# 3. More to Manly Safer Laneways

After submitting the final report to the Federal Government Safer Communities fund we were allocated an additional amount of funding. This has allowed council to complete two more actions; bud lighting in Market Lane, and a mural along the carpark tunnel access from Sydney Road to Pacific Waves carpark. Photos will be presented.

# 4. Night Time Economy

The following resolution was adopted at the 28 May Council meeting:

- A. Council prepare a policy on Night Time/Twilight & Culture Management Policy.
- B. The strategy underpinning the policy take into consideration two evening economies, twilight and night time and a range of possible activities and cultural activities used to activate an area.
- C. The policy identify areas in the local government area that are suitable for twilight/night time activities.

- D. Council investigate amending planning laws to ensure that new developments are adequately soundproofed for future night time activities and report back to Councillors.
- E. The strategy is done in consultation with residents, Chambers of Commerce, hospitality businesses, creatives, music industry, lighting technicians, security industry, environmental health professionals and any other related industries.
- F. A report be brought back to Council identifying timeframes, costing, impacts, benefits etc. and include a Councillor briefing updating Councillors on where Council is up to with current night time economy strategies and committee input within 4 months.

Council staff have now formed an internal working group that includes Community Safety as a key consideration in the development of the night time strategy. It is being led by Council's Director Planning and Place and will also include Economic Development, Compliance, Events, Strategic Planning, Development Assessment and Arts and Culture.

# 5. Community Safety Plan

The Northern Beaches Community Safety Plan is being developed, with the research and stakeholder interview stages nearing completion. A community engagement survey is due to commence soon.

Consultant, Patrick Shepherdson will be making a full presentation at the October meeting on the findings of the survey and the draft plan, which will then go on public exhibition.

# 6. Grant funding from Crime Prevention Division

Council has recently been the recipient of \$49,800 of grant funding from the Crime Prevention Division of NSW Communities and Justice. The objective of the project is to help reduce youth related anti-social behaviour and malicious damage in the Mona Vale and Newport public space areas. It also seeks to clearly identify and address the factors that increase the risk-taking attitudes that are leading to destructive behaviours that have been evidenced over the last 12 months.

The project activities will include:

- CPTED safety audits at hotspots and install appropriate access control measures when identified
- Link young people with legitimate artistic opportunities by involvement in installation of street art murals in Mona Vale and Newport
- Appoint a youth outreach agency to engage young people in Mona Vale and Newport, to be trialled during school holiday periods
- Develop diversionary activities at key times and locations that appeal to the target group

The project will be managed by the Community Safety Coordinator in consultation with Council's Youth Team, and concludes in June 2020.

Dear Minister

Thank you for your representations on behalf of Mr Michael Regan about the sale of nitrous oxide in NSW.

NSW Fair Trading regulates the sale of nitrous oxide in NSW under the Australian Consumer Law (ACL). Nitrous oxide has many legitimate uses, for example, as a propellant in whipped cream, high performance cars or short-term pain relief by dentists and other medical practitioners.

It is unfortunate to hear that there is an issue with the misuse of nitrous oxide within Mr Regan's council area and the serious health issues that arise as a result. The Department of Health has released educational material on the effects of nitrous oxide, and the substance is also regulated under the *Drug Misuse and Trafficking Act 1985*.

NSW Fair Trading cannot ban products that have a legitimate purpose but are deliberately misused by a purchaser under the ACL. Noting this, I have referred this matter to the Attorney General and the Minister for Health and Medical Research for their consideration and response.

#### **REPORT**

#### **PURPOSE**

Presentation by Dr Lisa Simone, Australian Drug Foundation (ADF) Manager NSW/ACT, to brief the Committee on the ADF piloting of the internationally renowned Planet Youth model in Australia, and to consider its potential for the Northern Beaches.

#### **REPORT**

The ADF are the auspicing body for the Northern Beaches Community Drug Action Team (CDAT) and the Local Drug Action Team (LDAT). The Council Community Safety Co-ordinator and Manager of the Sydney Drug Education and Counselling Centre (SDECC) recently attended the annual ADF conference that featured presentations from the Planet Youth team from Iceland, regarding the success of their model of substance misuse prevention amongst young people.

Subsequently an invitation was extended to Dr Lisa Simone, to brief the Committee on the initiative. Dr Simone has provided the following context to the presentation:

As an evidence-based organisation that delivers community programs, the Alcohol and Drug Foundation (ADF) is constantly searching for proven methods of preventing and delaying use of alcohol and other drugs (AOD) among young people; evidence shows the longer the time to initiation, the better long-term health and socio-economic outcomes.

In March 2019, our CEO Erin Lalor attended workshops in Iceland concerning that country's Planet Youth model of substance misuse prevention amongst adolescents. They have demonstrated a profound decline in the level of AOD use, and delays in the age of initiation among Icelandic youth since Planet Youth was introduced in 1998.

Subsequently, the Alcohol and Drug Foundation is exploring opportunities to test the Planet Youth projects in Australia, tailored to local needs and drawing on the expertise and resources of existing ADF programs. Between 1998 and 2016 the percentage of 15-16 year old Icelandic youth who had been drunk in the past 30 days declined from 42% to 5%; daily cigarette smoking dropped from 23% to 3%; and use of cannabis one or more times fell from 17% to 5%. Iceland has demonstrated an ability to amplify community-led prevention efforts by appropriately targeting the strongest risk factors and weakest protective factors. The model has been adopted in 11 EU countries and is now extending into South America and Africa.

# ALCOHOL AND DRUG FOUNDATION PILOTING WORLD RENOWNED ALCOHOL AND OTHER DRUG PREVENTION PROGRAM

The <u>Alcohol and Drug Foundation</u> is excited to announce it will trial an internationally renowned alcohol and other drug prevention program in Australia.

<u>Planet Youth</u> is an evidence-based program from Iceland that has significantly reduced alcohol and other drug use rates in young people.

Since the introduction of Planet Youth in Iceland in the nineties, youth alcohol and other drug use rates have transformed from some of the highest in Europe, to amongst the lowest. The country has also seen increased time spent by adolescents with parents, and reductions in bullying, juvenile crime and youth entering drug treatment.

Between 1998 and 2018, the percentage of Iceland's year ten students who had been drunk in the past 30 days fell from 42% to 5%; daily cigarette smokers in the same age group dropped from 23% to 2%; and the number of year ten students who used cannabis once or more in their lifetime declined from 17% to 6%.

Planet Youth has now been adopted in 20 countries including Ireland, Chile, Spain, France, Italy, Russia, Sweden and Norway.

The Alcohol and Drug Foundation is working with the Planet Youth team to trial the approach through the existing <u>Local Drug Action Team Program</u>, which is funded under the Australian Government's National Ice Action Strategy and managed by the Alcohol and Drug Foundation.

"The Planet Youth trial is a unique opportunity to apply international evidence to strengthen the work of Australia's Local Drug Action Teams," Alcohol and Drug Foundation Chief Executive Officer, Dr Erin Lalor said.

The pilot is set to take place over two-and-a-half-years in the locations listed below:

Limestone Coast (SA)

Murray Bridge (SA)

Glenorchy (TAS)

Huon Valley (TAS)

Hepburn (VIC)

Northern Mallee (VIC)

Wycheproof/Sea Lake (VIC)

Blue Mountains (NSW)

Lithgow (NSW)

Marrickville (NSW)





"The Local Drug Action Teams taking part in the trial have been selected for their strong local partnerships and commitment to preventing alcohol and drug-related harms," Dr Lalor remarked.

"The Planet Youth trial in Australia will be tailored to the unique needs of the different communities in the pilot sites," Dr Lalor added.

Local Drug Action Team representatives from the pilot sites will attend a training session with the Planet Youth team in Melbourne on Wednesday  $26^{th}$  June.

Planet Youth are currently in Melbourne for the Alcohol and Drug Foundation's <u>Prevention in Practice Conference</u> (24/25 June).

"Preventative health works fiscally *and* socially. However, it can sometimes take years and even generations to precisely determine a program's impact. Planet Youth shows that long term investment in community-led prevention leads to significant reductions in alcohol and other drug use," Dr Erin Lalor said.

"All speakers at the Prevention in Practice Conference, including a number of Local Drug Action Team representatives, will be sharing expertise on strengthening capacity of community-led action on alcohol and other drugs," Dr Lalor added.

# **REPORT**

Following a presentation on Rough Sleeping in Public Spaces at the June 2019 meeting the Committee made the following recommendations:

- A. That staff continue to research best practice and develop collaborations and strategies that assist in ameliorating this issue.
- B. That the Committee acknowledge support for national action to address homelessness and Affordable Housing, to ensure that homelessness is contained and encourage appropriate initiatives.
- C. That Council work with local and State agencies to develop a Northern Beaches Housing and Homelessness Discussion Paper.
- D. Educate the community on the issue of homelessness and agreed Homelessness Protocol.

James Griffin MP also advised that the Minister for Families, Communities and Disability Services, Gareth Ward MP will be visiting the area to attend an event in September (date TBC). He offered to negotiate a meeting with the Minister, Mayor and Committee representatives to talk through crisis accommodation and the long term housing options for those living with mental health issues and possible local solutions. The Committee will provide a discussion paper for the appropriate Ministers.

As a result, a local Housing and Homelessness Forum was held on 6 August with relevant local service providers and related agencies to identify gaps, discuss housing needs and envision future best practice for housing options. The outcomes are being used to prepare a discussion paper.

An overview of the forum will be presented to the Committee.

#### **REPORT**

#### **PURPOSE**

To advise the Committee on the latest initiatives being undertaken by the Northern Beaches Liquor Accord to reduce underage drinking, fake IDs and alcohol related problems in and around licensed venues.

#### **REPORT**

Doug Brooker is an executive member of the Northern Beaches Liquor Accord and is their representative on the Committee. Membership of the Liquor Accord is open to all licensed venues on the Northern Beaches ranging from restaurants, bottle shops, bars and hotels. At the last meeting of the Liquor Accord held on 17 July 2019 a number of safety related initiatives were adopted.

#### DISCUSSION

Doug will advise the Committee on the following initiatives and projects that the Liquor Accord are supporting:

- 1. Dark Matters is an educational project that aims to raise awareness amongst school leavers about the responsibilities and consequences of behaviour in the late night environment on the Northern Beaches and at licensed venues. It includes subsidising students to attend the accredited Responsible Service of Alcohol (RSA) course at TAFE, where the participants will also be briefed on Dark Matters. This work is in collaboration with the local Community Drug Action Team (CDAT) and TAFE. A grant for \$12,950 has been received from Liquor and Gaming to fund the implementation of this project. The Liquor Accord will also contribute towards the project.
- 2. Banned From One, Banned From All the Liquor Accord have agreed to proceed on the development of an initiative whereby minors can be barred for 12 months once they reach 18 years. This would occur if the minor is detected drinking on licensed premises, using false identification, refusing to supply name and age as well as some other related behaviours such as assault staff/police.
- 3. Representation to Local MPs regarding underage persons entering licensed premises.
