Members are advised of the following definitions of a "pecuniary" or "conflict" of interest for their assistance:

Section 442 of the Local Government Act, 1993 states that a "pecuniary" interest is as follows:

- "(1) [Pecuniary interest] A Pecuniary interest is an interest that a person has in a matter because of a reasonable likelihood or expectation of appreciable financial gain or loss to the person or another person with whom the person is associated.
- (2) [Remoteness] A person does not have a pecuniary interest in a matter if the interest is so remote or insignificant that it could not reasonably be regarded as likely to influence any decision the person might make in relation to the matter."

Members should reference the Local Government Act, 1993 for detailed provisions relating to pecuniary interests.



6.5	Community Impacts Of COVID-19 On Northern Beaches Area	Over 50 local service providers were contacted by Council staff in the week commencing 13 July. This has been a regular occurrence during COVID-19. Key findings will be reported to the Committee.
7.0	Manly Safety Audit	A late night Manly Safety Audit is to be arranged in partnership with Police, agencies and community members, towards the end of the year, COVID-19 restrictions permitting.

2. ISSUES ARISING

The following locations have been the subject of reports of community concern. These sites are being managed in collaboration with Police and other agencies to identify the issues and actions required to mitigate safety concerns.

- 2.1 Ivanhoe Park, Manly: Vandalism of the Botanic Garden. In response to the previously reported major vandalism in May, the Friends of Ivanhoe Park, Council staff and police met to discuss site security. Various measures were agreed upon to improve security and The Friends are keeping a register of antisocial behaviour at the Garden. An overall Management Plan for the garden is scheduled to commence in early 2021, and this will take into consideration further safety measures.
- 2.2 Dee Why Dunes Rough Sleepers. A number of long-term homeless people have caused considerable damage to this ecologically sensitive area over a period of time. Following extensive work by local housing and homelessness services, four people have now been assisted into alternate accommodation. The area is to be regenerated by Council's Parks and Recreation team as soon as possible to prevent re-habitation.

ISSUE

To brief the Committee on current trends in drug use issues amongst young people on the Northern Beaches.

BACKGROUND


The impact of COVID-19 on the community has been felt in many different ways. One issue of concern raised by local police and drug and alcohol workers is the apparent increase in the use of illicit drugs. Previous meetings have discussed the issue of 'Nangs' (nitrious oxide) and the ease of access for young people. Representations were subsequently made to the State Government requesting that the issue be considered for legislative change.

DISCUSSION

Belinda Volkov from Sydney Drug Education and Counselling Centre (SDECC) will brief the Committee on the experiences of drug and alcohol use of young people and families during COVID-19, including emerging issues. She will also discuss the increase in vaping amongst young people.

ISSUE

To seek feedback on the draft objectives and identify potential partners for the Community Safety Plan, prior to public exhibition.

BACKGROUND

The Community Safety Committee have previously indicated support for a strengths based approach that builds on the strong sense of safety on the Northern Beaches and how that can be sustained. The Community Safety Plan integrates key criteria required to apply for potential State or Federal government crime prevention funding, or other grant opportunities as they arise.

Previous briefings to the Committee on the development of the Plan addressed safety analysis, emerging themes and the results of community surveys and consultation.

This briefing will be on the key findings arising from the research and consultations for the Draft Plan, with an opportunity for discussion and feedback on the draft objectives. It will also consult the Committee on the identification of service provider partners to manage the key issues and actions that will arise in the Plan.

Following this meeting individual and round table meetings will be held with key service providers to further develop actions to meet the identified issues.

The next steps are:

- 1. October 2020 Submit draft Plan to Council to approve for public exhibition
- 2. November 2020 Review submissions from the public exhibition period, making variations where required
- 3. December 2020 Submit final draft Plan for adoption by Council

That the Community Safety Committee provide feedback around key objectives, and identify service provider partners that will contribute to actions within the Draft Community Safety Plan.

ISSUE

Proposed Trial for a Community Medical Waste (sharps and dialysis tubing) Collection Program

BACKGROUND

Representations have been made for Council to support a medical waste collection program.

Two other programs currently operate in the Northern Beaches area. These are:

- Needle and Syringe Program (NSP)
- Fitpack

The proposed trial does not replicate either of these two programs.

Needle and Syringe Program

Four Service Providers participate in NSW Health's Needle and Syringe Program providing needle exchange and community sharp collections. These are:

- i. Mona Vale Urgent Care
- ii. Brookvale Community Health Centre
- iii. Sydney Drug Education & Counselling Centre
- iv. Northern Beaches Hospital.

Fitpack

The Pharmacy Guild of Australia runs the Fitpack Scheme, funded by the NSW Ministry of Health, which allows people who inject drugs to obtain a free Fitpack in exchange for a used Fitpack from a participating NSP pharmacy.

In NSW, 60% of Fitpacks obtained from community pharmacies are returned to be disposed of responsibly, using the safe disposal systems operating within community pharmacies. The used Fitpacks are placed in a sharps container to be collected and destroyed by a licensed contractor.

This program is free for pharmacies to join and they receive \$3.50 funding for every Fitpack they collect for safe disposal.

Currently there are 7 pharmacies in the Northern Beaches area that offer this program, located in:



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- Manly
- Narrabeen
- Dee Why
- Harbord
- Elanora Heights
- Brookvale
- Avalon

NSW Health has recently identified areas in Sydney, where there is an increased need for sharps disposal, including the following six locations on the Northern Beaches:

- Belrose
- Terrey Hills
- Seaforth
- Narraweena
- Frenchs Forest
- Balgowlah

Pharmacies that provide community sharps collections are required to pay collection and disposal fees.

City of Ryde Program

City of Ryde Council provides a free service for residents who suffer from diabetes or kidney failure, enabling them to dispose of syringes and dialysis tubing in a safe manner. Residents can drop off their syringes and dialysis material at any of the participating pharmacies.

Council supplies the sharps containers free of charge to residents who are required to return the full containers to participating pharmacies.

City of Ryde has a rental agreement with a service provider who provide 100 sharps containers each year and collects the clinical waste bins from 14 participating chemists at an annual cost of \$7,500.

DISCUSSION

Providing safe and accessible disposal solutions for medical waste is a key consideration for local communities. Northern Beaches Council provides sharps collection bins in designated public toilets across the northern beaches. Some local pharmacies, hospitals and other agencies provide sharps disposal and Fitpack services.



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Both the Pharmacy Guild and a local pharmacy have identified a demand for expanded services and are seeking Council's support. Medical waste disposal services generally assist residents who suffer from diabetes or kidney failure. For the latter, disposal options are few and clinical waste is often disposed of in garbage bins.

Council's domestic garbage (red lidded bin) is collected and transferred to an Alternative Waste Processing Facility located at Eastern Creek where it is sorted, and any recyclable materials and organics are recovered from the waste stream for further processing and beneficial reuse. Medical waste is considered a contaminant if present in this process and may present an operational and safety risk.

Providing residents with accessible disposal options, provides a safe, practical solution for the disposal of medical waste.

It is proposed to conduct a trial, offering a service similar to that provided by the City of Ryde Council, whereby Council would provide a free service for residents who suffer from diabetes or kidney failure, enabling them to dispose of syringes and dialysis tubing in a safe manner. Council would supply the sharps containers free of charge and residents would be required to drop off their syringes and dialysis material at any of the participating pharmacies.

Comments are sought from the Community Safety Committee with respect to a 12-month trial of a Community Medical Waste (sharps and dialysis tubing) Collection Program in the six locations identified by NSW Health as having a need for such services.
