REPORT

PURPOSE

To present to the Economic & Smart Communities SRG the findings of the draft Economic Health Check as part of the data analysis for the Northern Beaches Economic Development Strategy.

REPORT

As part of the information gathering stage for the Northern Beaches Economic Development Strategy (EDS), consultants .ID The Population Excerpts have been engaged to pull together a draft Economic Health Check for the LGA.

This report provides a narrative about the local economy, including latest available economic data for 2016-2019. It also includes some forecast data on jobs and output to 2022. Most of the data is publicly available on the economy.id webpage. It draws on a range of data sets from ABS Census, ABR business registers, building approvals, tourism research, as well as recent estimates for jobs by industry, productivity, value- add and output from National Institute for Economic & Industry Research (NIEIR). New data, including Google mobility data has also been used to look at the impact of COVID-19 lockdowns of workforce movement.

Benchmarking against Greater Sydney, the report identifies the relative strengths and weaknesses of the Northern Beaches economy in terms of economic conditions, industry specialisms, demography and outlook. It also identifies macro-economic forces that may influence local economic conditions (including business confidence, retail trade and inflation).

The profile of the local economy and workforce outlined in the report generate several opportunities to grow a vibrant local economy, but also potential challenges. The Economic Development Strategy will build on this analysis to identify priorities to respond to these challenges and opportunities.

Rob Hall from .ID will present to the Economic & Smart Communities SRG the key findings from the draft Economic Health Check. A copy of the draft report is attached for review ahead of the presentation. As part of the discussion, we will be seeking feedback from the SRG members on the data findings. In particular, we would like to hear from members:

- To what extent the data reflects what you are seeing on the ground?
- What trends surprise you?
- What do you consider is the most significant insight?
- What do you think the KPIs (or measures of success) should be for the EDS moving forward?

Most of the data is publicly available on the <u>economy.id</u> webpage.

REPORT

PURPOSE

To update members of the Economic & Smart Communities SRG on the Council's Business Support Service and discuss opportunities to for its ongoing role within Council to help businesses navigate Council processes.

REPORT

On 5 January 2021 Council launched a new Business Support Service to provide a one-stop shop to case manage business enquiries within Council. The proposal for a case managed approach was first raised at the November 2020 Council meeting in a Mayoral Minute. This referenced feedback from business chambers and the Economic and Smart Communities Strategic Reference Group on challenges for local businesses when dealing with Council 'red tape'.

The original intent was to provide a single point of contact to manage business enquiries across Council business units and processes. It would provide access to information on a range of topics including:

- local business support/advice services
- insights into local economic conditions
- food licensing including food safety permits
- home businesses
- planning and development applications and advice
- business opportunities
- working with Council including tenders and procurement
- advertising sign advice and permits
- festival and event permits
- commercial activities on public land, including outdoor dining.

However, the declaration of the Northern Beaches lockdown on 20 December, brought a new urgency to setting in place a coordinated approach within Council to support local businesses. Consequently, Council created a new dedicated business hotline and established a case management approach to dealing with business enquiries. Given the timing of the service launch, not surprisingly the majority of calls were regarding COVID-19 support packages or advice on how to meet new COVID Safe requirements.

Following the Northern Beaches lockdown, appointments have continued to come through the online booking system and cover a range of enquiries, including outdoor dining, DAs, starting a home-based business, and grants for business growth/recovery. However, the case load has been significantly lower.

The onset of the third lockdown at the end of June, and especially restrictions for construction and non-essential retailers, saw another spike in calls around financial support and clarification on restrictions for businesses.



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To date around 250 businesses have connected with Council though this new Business Support Service.

We are now looking at how we can build on the Business Support Service as an ongoing initiative to help businesses navigate Council processes, as well as keeping the business community informed of COVID-19 business support. We have reached out to the Brisbane City, Liverpool City and City of Sydney councils who operate similar business concierge services, to share experiences on how to promote the service and improve processes for managing cases.

To inform a review of the Business Support Service within Council, we would welcome feedback from the Economic & Smart Communities SRG members on:

- what value does a dedicate Business Support Service bring to the Northern Beaches business community
- what functions within Council should be covered by the service
- how to best promote this service and encourage take-up by local businesses.

RECOMMENDATION

That members of the Economic & Smart Communities SRG note the update on the Council Business Support Service and participate in a discussion on its review.
