4.1 COMMUNITY STRATEGIC PLAN DEVELOPMENT WORKSHOP - MICHAEL MCDERMID

DISCUSSION

Michael McDermid, Executive Manager, Corporate Strategy and Planning led the discussion on this item and explained that the next stage of engagement on the Community Strategic Plan in March/April would focus on developing Goals and Strategies. A copy of the presentation provided to the group is attached to the notes at **Attachment 1**.

The group was invited to review the draft framework (goals and strategic considerations) at for inclusion in a Discussion Paper. Concern was expressed that safety was not adequately addressed and this needed to be strengthened in the framework.

4.3 CONFLICT AROUND SHARED USE OF PUBLIC SPACE - WORKSHOP - LEANNE MARTIN

DISCUSSION

Leanne Martin, Co-ordinator Community Safety provided a short presentation "Managing the ever increasing use of our public space and how to keep them safe" is attached to the notes at **Attachment 2**.

ACTION

The Community Safety Strategic Reference Group participated in the following discussion about managing public space with East Esplanade as they hypothetical example. The group was asked to strategically consider ideas that may help ease the pressures that are predicted:

Question: What are the likely impacts of increasing use of public spaces and what makes it appealing to residents?

Answer:

- It is a cost effective and convenient location for residents to meet.
- tourists and backpackers can highly utilise,
- brings a sense of community / meeting place,
- keeps it local and prevents additional requirements for transport and travel outside the area, addresses urban density issues (lack of back yards to host events at home),
- capacity is not necessarily capped and is more flexible in regards to time restrictions,
- easy to promote on social media and
- nice experience.

Q: What can we do to manage this better and keep it safe?

Answer:

- Amended Legislation to provide power for Rangers to enforce the law needs to further assist Council
- Clarification of zones which need to be fair, equitable and consistent across council so-Rangers/Police can enforce
- Clearer signage for alcohol prohibited areas
- Council bins during busy periods need to be increased to prevent littering and remaining rubbish.
- Public Toilet access

• A shift from passive to active management roles in some public areas

Q: Can any of these ideas be considered in our Community Strategic Plan?

Answer:

- Revision of Local Enforcement Agencies powers
- Revision of Alcohol Prohibited Areas and Alcohol Free Zones for the community and enforcement agencies.
- Revision and implementation of Council Infrastructure during large events and high peak times to control rubbish / litter.


Increasing pressures on limited spaces




Why is this changing – what issues do you think are contributing to the increased pressure on public space?
