Committee held on Wednesday, 10 June, 2015 in the Guringai Room, Civic

### 2. CONFIRMATION OF MINUTES

2.1. The minutes of the meeting held on 28 January, 2015 were confirmed as correct by Alan Jones and Julie Whitfield.

### 3.1 Terms of Reference

### 3.2 Funding

The committee were directed to Attachment 1 - Narrabeen Lagoon State Park - Asset Roles and Responsibilities that had been circulated with the agenda. This spreadsheet describes the service Council currently delivers within the State Park, and discussion was held regarding whether the Committee should seek to maintain the status quo, or to increase the levels of service but at what cost. The Committee agreed that the Asset Roles and Responsibilities spreadsheet was accurate, but that the list needed some sense of scale of expenditure.

Council's CFO has advised the Trust could be accounted as a separate entity, which would assist in planning future projects and income.

Mr Clarke provided an explanation of what Crown Lands sought from a Trust, noting that Council should define the current cost per annum of managing the reserves in order for Crown Lands to determine the additional funding required to achieve improvements to service levels in the State Park. Crown Lands seek a baseline of current Council expenditure for the number of hectares the State Park covers.

Expenditure figures from last meeting were reviewed, and the potential costs for additional items were noted. Mr Clarke requested that staff consider adding additional information to existing expenditure spreadsheet, including 5 year plan projections, and bring it back to the next meeting for discussion. It was recommended that opportunities for revenue raising and the current complement of licences and leases with this Park also be included.

### 3.4 Waterway Use

Presentation by Warringah Council

Option approved by Council was to install navigational markers in lieu of dredging. Mr Turnbull gave an overview of the planned marker buoy installation around the shallow seagrass area and navigation channel, including what colours would be used and what they mean. He advised that these should be installed by the end of financial year, and that maps and brochures will be provided to user groups explaining the meaning of the navigational markers and their significance. To inform the general community of this initiative signs will be placed on boat ramps and articles will be put in Manly Daily.

It should also be noted that grant applications have been unsuccessful, and that Council will fund the installation costs.

The Committee congratulated staff on this initiative.

### 3.5 State Park Boundaries

Presentation by Warringah Council

The Narrabeen Lagoon State Park - Land parcel consideration matrix was reviewed.

Mr Clarke requested changing the weightings of ownership / management, and suggested when grading land owners Warringah Council and Crown Lands be graded a 10, and where land is owned by other government agencies or other entities staff needed to look at 6 or 8 rating depending on who that may be.

The Committee endorsed the matrix subject to consideration of amending the weightings based on land ownership. It was agreed that staff would adjust the weightings as discussed, and run the matrix for public land parcels surrounding the lagoon. The draft matrix has been amended as discussed and the worked examples are included as Attachment 3.

Result from the full land parcel review will be "clustered" into similar parcel groups, and circulated to the Committee.

### 3.6 Alleged Unauthorised Developments

Presentation by Warringah Council

Development around the edge of the Lagoon was reviewed. It was noted that a number of land owners had extended their property onto Crown Land fringing Narrabeen Lagoon, as well as the existence of a number of discrete parcels of Crown Land that are effectively treated as private property. The question was raised as to what action could be taken and a number of options were discussed.

It was agreed that the Committee would like public access around the lagoon but recognise the difficulties in obtaining this. The Committee sought advice on where to from here and it was suggested that public access should be the first priority, but if this was not possible then Crown Lands should consider mechanisms to authorise the use of the land in question.




